Background on the Gully Family

The Colorado Gold Rush and the Homestead Act brought many newcomers to the region in the 1860s. Farms and ranches popped up in what is now Aurora. The Gully Homestead House is believed to be the oldest building still standing in Aurora. Thomas and Temperance Gully first homesteaded near the present intersection of Mississippi Avenue and Chambers Road in the late 1860s after spending a few years in the mining towns of Colorado.


The earliest verifiable date for the structure is 1870, as evidenced by a German newspaper used as insulation in the walls. The Gully's youngest son, John, and his wife, Elizabeth, raised five children in the house. The Gully House was a community place, with the Gully family holding Rodeos from the 1920's to 1950's. The family continuously occupied the house into the early 1960s, at which time it was abandoned in a state of disrepair.






